SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/2-3.80

Amends the School Code. Provides that a school district that offers a secondary agricultural education program that is eligible for State and federal funding must ensure that, at a minimum, the following are available to its secondary agricultural education students: (1) an instructional sequence of courses approved by the State Board of Education; (2) a State and nationally affiliated FFA chapter that is integral to instruction and is not treated as an extracurricular activity; and (3) a mechanism for ensuring the involvement of all secondary agricultural education students in formal, supervised, agricultural-experience activities and programs.

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AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 2 represented in the General Assembly: 3

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Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section 5 2-3.80 as follows:

(105 ILCS 5/2-3.80) (from Ch. 122, par. 2-3.80) 6

7 Sec. 2-3.80. (a) The General Assembly recognizes that agriculture is the most basic and singularly important industry 8 in the State, that agriculture is of central importance to the 9 10 welfare and economic stability of the State, and that the maintenance of this vital industry requires a continued source 11 trained and qualified individuals for employment 12 of in agriculture and agribusiness. The General Assembly hereby 13 14 declares that it is in the best interests of the people of the 15 State of Illinois that a comprehensive education program in agriculture be created and maintained by the State's public 16 17 school system in order to ensure an adequate supply of trained 18 and skilled individuals and to ensure appropriate 19 representation of racial and ethnic groups in all phases of the 20 industry. It is the intent of the General Assembly that a State program for agricultural education shall be a part of the 21 22 curriculum of the public school system K through adult, and made readily available to all school districts which may, at 23 their option, include programs in education in agriculture as a 24 25 part of the curriculum of that district.

(b) The State Board of Education shall adopt such rules and 26 regulations as are necessary to implement the provisions of 27 28 this Section. The rules and regulations shall not create any new State mandates on school districts as a condition of 29 30 receiving federal, State, and local funds by those entities. It is in the intent of the General Assembly that, although this 31 32 Section does not create any new mandates, school districts are

strongly advised to follow the guidelines set forth in this
Section.

3 (c) The State Superintendent of Education shall assume 4 responsibility for the administration of the State program 5 adopted under this Section throughout the public school system 6 as well as the articulation of the State program to the requirements and mandates of federally assisted education. 7 8 There is currently within the State Board of Education an agricultural education unit to assist school districts in the 9 10 establishment and maintenance of educational programs pursuant 11 to the provisions of this Section. The staffing of the unit 12 shall at all times be comprised of an appropriate number of 13 full-time employees who shall serve as program consultants in agricultural education and shall be available to provide 14 15 assistance to school districts. At least one consultant shall 16 be responsible for the coordination of the State program, as 17 Head Consultant. At least one consultant shall be responsible for the coordination of the activities of student and 18 19 agricultural organizations and associations.

20 (d) A committee of 13 agriculturalists representative of the various and diverse areas of the agricultural industry in 21 22 Illinois shall be established to at least develop a curriculum 23 and overview the implementation of the Build Illinois through 24 Quality Agricultural Education plans Illinois of the 25 Leadership Council for Agricultural Education and to advise the 26 State Board of Education on vocational agricultural education. 27 The Committee shall be composed of the following: (6) 28 agriculturalists representing the Illinois Leadership Council 29 for Agricultural Education; Secondary Agriculture (2) 30 Teachers; (1) "Ag In The Classroom" Teacher; (1) Community 31 College Agriculture Teacher; (1) Adult Agriculture Education 32 Teacher; (1) University Agriculture Teacher Educator; and (1) FFA Representative. All members of the Committee shall be 33 appointed by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of 34 35 the Senate. The terms of all members so appointed shall be for 3 years, except that of the members initially appointed, 5 36

1 shall be appointed to serve for terms of 1 year, 4 shall be 2 appointed to serve for terms of 2 years and 4 shall be 3 appointed to serve for terms of 3 years. All members of the 4 Committee shall serve until their successors are appointed and 5 qualified. Vacancies in terms shall be filled by appointment of the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate for the 6 7 extent of the unexpired term. The State Board of Education 8 shall implement a Build Illinois through Quality Agricultural Education plan following receipt of these recommendations 9 which shall be made available on or before March 31, 1987. 10 Recommendations shall include, but not be limited to, the 11 12 development of a curriculum and a strategy for the purpose of 13 establishing a source of trained and qualified individuals in agriculture, a strategy for articulating the State program in 14 15 agricultural education throughout the public school system, 16 and a consumer education outreach strategy regarding the 17 importance of agriculture in Illinois. The committee of agriculturalists shall serve without compensation. 18 19 (e) A school district that offers a secondary agricultural 20 education program that is eligible for State and federal

21 <u>funding must ensure that, at a minimum, all of the following</u> 22 <u>are available to its secondary agricultural education</u> 23 <u>students:</u>

24(1) An instructional sequence of courses approved by25the State Board of Education.

26 (2) A State and nationally affiliated FFA (Future

28 and is not treated as an extracurricular activity.

29 (3) A mechanism for ensuring the involvement of all
30 secondary agricultural education students in formal,
31 supervised, agricultural-experience activities and
32 programs.
